Remember the techniques and skills you have learnt in lessons and set high standards for your work.

- Research Pop Art. Find out about the work of Andy Warhol and Claes Oldenburg. Create a
 PowerPoint presentation, poster or booklet including pictures and facts. Be creative in your
 presentation.
- Draw things that have text on them such as packaging for food or toiletries e.g. crisp packet, tin, cereal box, toothpaste, shampoo etc. Take your time to look at the object really closely, add detail, tone and texture to your drawing.
- Research collage artists and techniques. This could include Hannah Hoch, Kurt Schwitters, Rebeka Elizegi, Pablo Picasso or Create a PowerPoint presentation, poster or booklet including pictures and facts. Be creative in your presentation.
- Make your own collages by cutting and ripping old magazines, newspapers, packaging or scraps of paper and combining different shapes and images. Try to be creative to make an unusual collage, not something realistic. Take inspiration from the pictures here or from the Project Collage book from our Year 8 reading list (extracts of this have been uploaded to Doddle). You could make a collage inspired by the topsy turvy world of Alice in Wonderland or use your own imagination.
- Take photographs of the people in your house (with their permission) or of yourself. Edit
 these photos using different filters or colours and save all of the versions. If you can, you
 could print these photos and make collages from them or you could draw or doodle over
 them. Write notes about what you did reflecting on how successful it was and what you
 could do differently.
- Read the books on our Year 8 reading list (or the extracts put onto Doddle) and make your own artwork inspired by them.

- Make your own art using text words, letters, numbers or an alphabet. Be creative about what you use to make it, it could be objects arranged and photographed, made out of food, paper, card or made digitally. Many artists use text in their work. You could research the work of David Carson, Barbara Kruger, Bob and Roberta Smith, Ines Seidal or Jasper Johns for inspiration. You could write 'Stay at home' or another positive message.
- Create an invitation to a tea party inspired by Alice in Wonderland. You could even have a
 tea party at home and make cakes (either real ones or sculptures using things you find in the
 recycling or using the template given here). You could also make paper teacups and
 decorations too. Mrs Ryder had an Alice in Wonderland tea party at home with her family
 and her children made mini top hats out of empty toilet roll tubes! Take photos of your tea
 party if you have one.
