- Copy any of the drawings on this worksheet as accurately as you can or use them as a starting point to make your own drawings using your imagination.
- Research the work of Barbara Walker, a black British artist from Birmingham who explores racism and stereotypes about young people. Create a PowerPoint presentation, poster or booklet including pictures and facts and copy some of her work as accurately as you can. Be creative in your presentation.
- Continue to work on your own personal project about something you are interested in, it could be a sport, hobby, film, book, game, cars, jewellery, music, animal, anything that is important or interesting to you. Create a PowerPoint presentation, poster or booklet including pictures and facts and opinions about it. Be creative in your presentation.
- Research Pop Art. Find out about the work of Andy Warhol, Roy Lichtenstein and Pauline Boty. Create a PowerPoint presentation, poster or booklet including pictures and facts. Be creative in your presentation.
- Make a detailed, tonal drawing of an object that has text on it e.g. a crisp or sweet packet, tin, cereal box, toothpaste or shampoo bottle.
- Take photographs of any of the things listed above (objects with text) be creative with viewpoints, think about backgrounds and if you can, you could edit the photos to make them more interesting and creative. Save different versions. Write about the changes you made and whether you think they were successful.
- Read books from our Year 9 Art reading list or from the 18 by 18 reading list. Make artwork inspired by what you read.

• Experiment with making art using food and other things you find at home (please do not use a lot and ask permission first). Look at the work of Nathan Wyburn who makes his art using ketchup, soy sauce, bean juice and even marmite on toast! Or the work of artist Prudence Staite who makes pizza portraits (see Barack Obama below) and chocolate sculptures. You could try mark making techniques using food or have a go at a portrait like the portrait of Taylor Swift below drawn with coffee or a pizza portrait inspired by Prudence Staite.
